

Frequently Asked Questions About Becoming Catholic

How Does One Become Catholic? Those who have never been baptized, as well as some baptized individuals, are initiated through the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) process that leads to the full initiation into the sacramental life of the Church at the Easter Vigil, the Church's annual celebration of Easter.

What Does RCIA Involve? The RCIA meets each Monday evening from 6:30pm – 8:45pm beginning in the fall, through Easter. There are service opportunities, retreats, Bible studies, and prayer services which help you become incorporated into the Body of Christ.

Are there other RCIA classes besides the Sept-Easter class?

Yes, we have a summer class that meets on Sundays at 5pm and meets June –August. If you have been baptized (Catholic or another denomination) and have been attending Mass regularly for at least 9 months, we invite you to join us for the summer RCIA class.

What is Inquiry? This is the first step to become a Catholic through the RCIA process. This period may vary in length according to God's timing and the work of the Holy Spirit in you. Conversion is a gradual process and a faith journey. The aim of this period is to awaken one's faith. Inquiry classes meet monthly at 6:30pm in Kenny Hall.

If you have been baptized already, you'll need to bring a copy of your baptismal certificate with you to the conference.

If I Begin, Am I Obligated to Become a Catholic? No, there is no obligation to make any kind of commitment nor is there pressure exerted on anyone to become a Catholic. We respect the conscience and decision of every inquirer. We hope you will gain a deeper appreciation and understanding of Catholic beliefs and practices through your attendance at Inquiry.

I Am Already Baptized. Will I Need to Be Baptized Again? Generally not. The Catholic Church recognizes the action of the Holy Spirit in other Christian communities and accepts valid Christian baptisms.

What is A Sponsor? What if I Don't Know Anyone Who Can Be My Sponsor? A sponsor is a confirmed Catholic in good standing who has volunteered to be your companion during your faith journey. They are a role model, a mentor to help you in your discovery of how a faithful Catholic lives. Sponsors commit to pray with and for you, attend RCIA sessions with you and generally help you to become a part of the parish family. If you do not have someone to be your sponsor, we'll provide you with one.

Are Catholics Christians? Yes. The term Christian refers to all who recognize Jesus as the Christ (Messiah) and Lord. Catholics are the one group of Christians who can trace their lineage as a Church back to Jesus' Twelve Apostles.

Why Can't I Go to Communion? Sharing of the Eucharist is a sign of full unity, an expression of shared belief, practice and fellowship in the Catholic Church. We respectfully ask those who are not yet one with us in belief to refrain from receiving the Eucharist. Everyone is invited to come forward at the time of Communion to receive a blessing from the priest or Eucharistic minister. Simply indicate your desire for a blessing by crossing your arms across your chest.
