

To know, love, and serve as Jesus did

"As a body is one though it has many parts, and all the parts of the body, though many, are one body, so also Christ. For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons, and we were all given to drink of one Spirit.

Now the body is not a single part, but many.

If a foot should say, "Because I am not a hand I do not belong to the body," it does not for this reason belong any less to the body. Or if an ear should say, "Because I am not an eye I do not belong to the body," it does not for this reason belong any less to the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be?

But as it is, **God placed the parts**, each one of them, in the body as he intended. If they were all one part, where would the body be?

But as it is, **there are many parts, yet one body.** The eye cannot say to the hand, "I do not need you," nor again the head to the feet, "I do not need you."

Indeed, the parts of the body that seem to be weaker are all the more necessary, and those parts of the body that we consider less honorable we surround with greater honor, and our less presentable parts are treated with greater propriety, whereas our more presentable parts do not need this. But God has so constructed the body as to give greater honor to a part that is without it, so that there may be no division in the body, but that the parts may have the same concern for one another.





At the beginning of this fiscal year we celebrated our first anniversary at the Buford Highway location of our Hispanic Mission, Cristo Rey. Father Feiser Muñoz enthusiastically lead our Hispanic Ministry and a second Mass was added this year to accommodate the growing congregation. We had over 300 students in PSR at the Mission with 84 receiving their first communion and 115 confirmed.





This December, at least 800 students and parents attended Advent Wonderland to learn about Christmas and Advent traditions around the world. Later that month, 44 parish children enhanced our Christmas Eve celebrations by enacting the Christmas gospel. Local news, Channel 46, even captured some of the pageant for their viewership.



The Youth Ministry department continues to experience growth. This year we expanded to a three-person staff model, began Summit small groups, one-on-one discipling with upperclassmen teens, and went on a Mission trip to Mexico.



This year the 20/30 Somethings experienced tremendous growth after starting monthly Discipleship Nights. Evenings began with daily Mass, followed by dinner and a guest speaker. In addition, the ministry hosted monthly adoration hours, service events, and socials.



Our mission at the Cathedral is to know, love, and serve as Christ Jesus taught us. The first part, to know, is achieved through our education programs outlined on this page. Our community building ministries and retreats allow us to share the love of Christ with each other. And finally, through service we extend our hearts and hands to those in need.

This year we began Foundations of Faith (FoF), an adult education offering on Thursday evenings. The program was designed as an introduction to the Catholic faith and hosted guest speakers and a core team of passionate presenters aimed at introducing (or reintroducing) the many ways Catholics glorify God through the Mass, sacraments, prayers, teachings, and traditions. Topics included Why I'm Catholic, How to Receive the Eucharist, When Your Mind Wanders at Mass, and more. The program was open to all adults regardless of where they were in their spiritual life.







About 1,500 youth at CTK learn about Jesus and the Catholic Church as they prepare for the sacraments of reconciliation, first communion, and confirmation through the Parish School of Religion (PSR), EDGE, and LifeTeen programs. In addition, young children break open the scripture in our Children's Liturgy of the Word at the Sunday 9:00 AM Masses.

Adults interested in learning more about becoming Catholic and preparing to enter the Church participate in the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA). This year we welcomed 75 men and women into the Church at Easter! In addition to catechesis programs, we have bible studies, adult education programming, Advent & Lenten missions, and a vibrant young adult ministry.

At the end of last fiscal year, Parish Council completed a parish wide survey entitled, "Is Your Parish Your Community?" With nearly 400 responses, we learned that the majority found their community at the Cathedral through involvement in ministries and friendships with parishioners outside of church activities. Those friendships were strengthened through praying together, studying the faith, and gathering for meals

As a result of the survey, Parish Council worked together to launch CTK Small Groups at the start of this fiscal year. Through these groups, 6 to 8 couples or 12 to 16 individuals gather weekly for a couple of hours of social time, study, and prayer. In our first year, we had 471 parishioners in 37 womens, mens, co-ed, and married groups. Together, these groups have experienced what it means to be one body, in Christ, sharing in each other's sufferings and joys.



## Me are ONE BODY IN CHRIST

This was our 9th year participating in the MUST Summer Lunch Program and we continue to be amazed at how the Lord faithfully provides. Whether it's the drivers we need to deliver lunches on Tuesday mornings or the funds to purchase cases of bread, ham, and cheese, God never fails us.

"Each week is a lesson in faith. I think no one will show up to drive the lunches and then four families driving Suburbans show up. We always have just enough. I'm a true believer now," said Bernadette Flowers, Associate Director of Parish Life. "Matthew 9:37-38 is a favorite scripture for this project. Jesus sends so many volunteers each week to make sandwiches, deliver lunches, and provide the supplies."

According to Gayle Kruger, site coordinator for the North Fulton distribution site, "We would not be able to do this without you. The lunches Christ the King provides each week represent the Tuesday lunch total." Through the generosity of all the MUST volunteers and benefactors, we were able to extend the love of Jesus to his children with these lunches.



Shawls and blankets are gifts given to those in need of comfort such as those dying, those who have lost a loved one, and those going through a divorce. Members gather monthly to pray for those that will receive the shawl or blanket and knit together. Those unable to join in person are able to knit from home.











This Christmas, 400 families were served by the Adopt-a-Family ministry in conjunction with Catholic Charities, St. Vincent de Paul Society, and Hispanic Ministries.
